PREFACE

This booklet contains a first compilation of how regional seas contribute to the implementation of the Global Programme of Action for the Protection of the Marine Environment from Land-based Activities (GPA). It is the first issue in a bi-annual series aimed at providing a comprehensive overview of progress in the implementation of the GPA by regional seas, international governmental and non-governmental organisations as well as governments and the private sector. In this issue, special attention is given to the regional seas programmes and agreements, which has been identified by Governments as the main regional framework for delivery of the GPA. The present compilation was edited by the GPA Coordination Office on the basis of the contributions received. The GPA Coordination Office is solely responsible for the content of this booklet.

The GPA is a result of years of work by Governments, international and non-governmental organisations and built upon their experience. It was officially adopted in Washington D.C., USA, in 1995 by 108 Governments and the European Commission as a comprehensive programme devoted to the protection and conservation of the marine environment from the adverse impacts of land-based activities. The GPA is designed to be a source of conceptual and practical guidance to be drawn upon by national and/or regional authorities in devising and implementing sustained action to prevent, reduce, control and/or eliminate marine degradation from land-based activities.

As countries seek more socially viable forms of development, the participation of the private sector and other stakeholders go hand-in-hand with the GPA aims of integrating protection of the marine environment into relevant environmental, social and economic development policies. Participation of local communities, in the broadest sense, is progressively being recognised as one important condition for the conservation and sustainability of coastal and marine resources. Attention to their efforts in implementing the GPA will thus be given in the next issues of this booklet.

The implementation of the GPA requires new approaches and new forms of partnerships among Governments, international, non-governmental organisations and the private sector. As Secretariat of the GPA, UNEP was assigned the task to lead the coordination efforts required to set in motion the Programme's activities and oversee its implementation. By sharing information on how partners implement the GPA, the UNEP/GPA Coordination Office, established in The Hague, The Netherlands, and fully operational since mid 1999, hopes to promote concrete actions to address land-based activities.

Recognising that this first attempt contains only selected and limited information, we call upon our partners to provide updated information on their progress in implementing the GPA. This first overview will be updated and expanded every six months as we receive more information on progress in programmes, activities, workplans and projects, executed in support of the GPA. The GPA clearing-house web site (at http://www.gpa.unep.org) will provide the most current source of up-to-date information on GPA partners and their activities. The updated text of this overview can also be viewed, downloaded or printed directly from the web site.

This booklet is published for the occasion of the United Nations General Assembly Special Session on the Barbados Action Programme on Small Island Development States.

Many individuals and organisations contributed to this booklet with information and support, for which the GPA Coordination Office expresses its appreciation for their interest and help.

REGIONAL SEAS

Regional Seas

The implementation of the GPA is primarily the task of Governments, in close cooperation with all stakeholders including local communities, public organizations and the private sector. The GPA identifies the Regional Seas Programme of UNEP as an appropriate framework for delivery of the GPA at the regional level.

The Regional Seas Programme was initiated by UNEP in 1974 as a global programme implemented through regional components. Since then, the Governing Council of UNEP has repeatedly endorsed a regional approach to the control of marine pollution and the management of marine and coastal resources and has requested the development of regional actions plans.

The UNEP Regional Seas Programme at present includes 13 regions and has over 140 coastal States and Territories participating in it. In addition, there are three non-UNEP regional seas (Arctic, OSPAR for the North-East Atlantic, and HELCOM for the Baltic). All these programmes are conceived as action-oriented being concerned not only with the consequences but also for the causes of environmental degradation, encompassing comprehensive approaches to combating such problems through the sound management of marine and coastal areas. Each regional action plan is formulated according to the needs of the region as perceived by the Governments concerned. The action plans promote the parallel development of regional legal framework agreements and of action-oriented programme activities.

Explanatory notes to the overview tables 1 and 2 on implementation of the GPA by Regional Seas

Policy setting is a widely used tool when developing integrated policies, such as Integrated Coastal Management. The process of policy setting for integrated environmental management is cyclic, evolves in time and can be described in a number of phases. Each cycle addresses problem identification, planning, implementation, and evaluation. Each of these phases in the cycle can be subdivided in a number of different steps. The following two tables give an overview of the status of implementation in the 16 regional seas of each of these policy steps. The first table deals with the first two phases, i.e. problem identification and planning. In addition, it provides specific information relating to the legal status of regional seas agreements. The second table deals with national implementation and evaluation of programmes on land-based activities, whereby two additional elements are mentioned: identification of needs for support and the identification of opportunities to support the implementation of the GPA.

Terminology:

TABLE 1: Progress in addressing land-based activities (LBA) by Regional Seas

1. Problem identification

<u>Monitoring</u>: collection of data and information on land-based activities and their impact on the coastal and marine environment.

<u>Assessment</u>: the process of compiling, integrating and analyzing information including economic, social and institutional information, emanating from monitoring and inventory activities.

2. Planning

<u>Regional Programmes of Action on LBA</u>: Regional accepted strategies, by Governments, which define regional priorities and actions related to land-based activities

<u>National Programmes of Action on LBA</u>: Translation of the Regional Programmes on LBA into a national strategy, action plan or programme.

3. Regulatory Framework

<u>Voluntary Codes</u>: codes of conducts, guidelines, incentives <u>Regional Conventions</u>: legally binding regional agreements

<u>Protocol on LBA</u>: legally binding agreement or annex to the regional convention specifically addressing land-based activities.

TABLE 2: Status of regional and national programmes on land-based activities, and identification of needs and opportunities

- **4. Identification of needs**: needs for support to programme implementation, both inside and outside the region
- **5. Identification of opportunities**: new and existing socio-economic developments that offer opportunities to forward the implementation of the GPA (such as tourism, mariculture, harbors, integrated coastal/freshwater management approaches, public/private partnerships, etc)
- **6. Implementation, including operation and maintenance** (mainly at national level)

Management instruments:

Regulation/legislation: national and local laws, standards, permits

Economic/financial instruments: taxes, subsidies, domestic funding, public/private partnerships

Structural/operational measures:

Infrastructural projects: sewage treatment plants, land-use plans, upgrading of industrial machinery

Cleaner production/best practices: Best Available Technology, best management practices for environmental enhancement of industries (waste water reduction, energy efficiency)

<u>Institutional arrangements</u>:

Institutions: the structure of governmental and non-governmental organisations, which provide the institutional mechanisms responsible for and are capable of developing and implementing management programmes and plans

Capacity building: including training workshops, environmental education, conferences Awareness/public participation: information dissemination, consultation with the public, involvement of NGO's

7. Evaluation: the extent to which programme implementation has accomplished its aims and objectives, the lessons learned and the identification of changes required to initiate a new programme. Evaluating accomplishments and shortcomings should be seen as vital feedback for any new monitoring and assessment.

Explanatory notes to the Regional Seas fact sheets

When addressing land-based activities, a possible process is a phased approach whereby the legal framework follows an extensive planning phase. However, it is recognized that this process may not necessarily be followed in that order at a regional level. For instance, the development of a regional action programme on land-based activities may at times occur *after* the adoption/entry-into-force of a legally binding regional protocol on land-based activities rather than before. In this scenario, the development of a regional programme of action can be seen as an implementation tool, rather than serving as a planning tool for the adoption of a legal framework on land-based activities. The information for each of the Regional Seas fact sheets tries to reflect the above processes. After general information on a Convention or Action Plan, the second part of the fact sheet deal with information relevant to **Land-based Activities** only.
