






Sources of knowledge used by total of interviewees

Question 3: What elements are needed to ensure that the Biodiversity knowledge landscape can better inform policy? — The governance perspective

- Balance legitimacy (policy mandate), credibility (scientific quality and independence) and saliency (openness and trustfullness of process)
- Building on existing networks, ensure continuity of NoK
- Strategic governance approach with commonly agreed priorities and self-reinforcing processes (> group 2) [but trying to use bottom-up participatory processes]
- Adaptive structure on topics and communities involved (reaching out beyond biodiversity)
- Create a "learning environment" to make it attractive for participation
