WILLIAM JARDINE PAPERS - INTRODUCTION

The William Jardine Papers in the Royal Scottish Museum (R.S.M.) relate to Sir William Jardine the naturalist and ornithologist, seventh Baronet of Applegirth, Dumfriesshire (1800 - 1874). They consist almost entirely of letters received by Sir William, covering the years 1821 - 1848. There are a few copies of draft replies, and some letters between other individuals, presumably sent to Jardine for reference. Other material consists of a manuscript volume for "Contributions to Ornithology"; reprints of articles by Jardine and other contemporary scientists; Jardine's journal of his tour of Holland in 1825, and a transcript (by H.S. Gladstone) of the one describing the 1834 tour of Sutherland; a few notes and three scrapbooks - "Jardine Hall Flower Garden I" containing botanical drawings, "Miscellanea Zoologica" containing notes, drawings and cuttings, and Jardine's scrapbook of the Salmon Fisheries Survey which includes a copy of his commission of appointment, notes, sketch maps and views of rivers, copies of rules of fishing associations and clubs, copies of notices of meetings held for the Commission and newspaper cuttings relating to salmon and the survey.

The William Jardine Papers in the Royal Scottish Museum are part of the larger Harvie-Brown collection. After Sir William's death, John A. Harvie-Brown, the Scottish naturalist (1844 - 1916) who admired Sir William's work and had visited Jardine Hall in 1870, was in correspondence with Alfred Newton of Cambridge. Newton knew Jardine's daughter, Helen Ratcliff, and through her family connections they managed to persuade Jardine's grandson, the ninth baronet, Sir William, to sell some papers to Harvie-Brown and Newton in 1899. Newton took the correspondence from P.J. Selby to Jardine to join the Jardine to Selby letters in the University Museum of Zoology, Cambridge, where they are still held. Harvie-Brown took the remainder, and they passed with his own papers to the Royal Scottish Museum after his death. Other Jardine material, mainly correspondence, was acquired for Jardine's great grand-son,

Prof Newton had advised Mrs Ratchiff that, possibly, I would be the person most likely to value the possession of the late Sir William Jardine's letters & pamphlets, & especially such letters as relate to Scottish Nat. 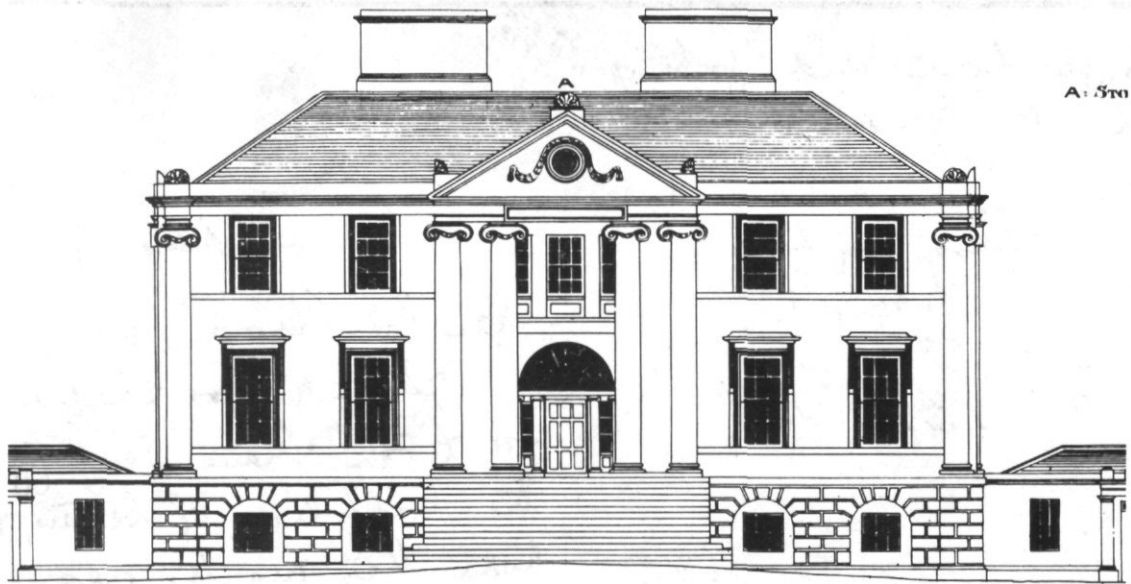

Norman B. Kinnear (1882 - 1957) by his mother, who was the daughter of Jardine's eldest daughter, Helen Maxwell. In 1920 Kinnear joined the staff of the British Museum (Natural History) and presented a small volume of Jardine letters of 1852 to the Zoology Library there. Further letters (mainly covering the years 1838 - 1841) were given by Kinnear's widow to Edinburgh University Library, but the location of other Jardine correspondence originally held by Kinnear is not known.

William Jardine was born in Edinburgh on 23 February 1800, son of Alexander Jardine and Jane Dorcas Maule. In 1807 Sir Alexander succeeded to the Jardine estates in Dumfriesshire and in 1814 he demolished the old Jardine Hall (built in 1708) and began to build the newer one (greatly enlarged in 1894 and finally demolished in 1964). As a boy Jardine attended

Edinburgh High School, and sometimes carried specimens to Dr. John Barclay, the anatomist. At fifteen William was sent to school in York 'to learn English'. At seventeen he entered Edinburgh University and boarded at the house of the Rev. Dr. Grant. He attended classes in literature and medicine, his teachers including Prof. Robert Jameson, John Barclay, Robert Allen and John Lizars (later to become his brother-in-law). His love of ornithology was fostered by John Wilson, a janitor at the University who preserved natural history specimens for the Museum.

In 1820 Jardine married Jean (always known as 'Jane') Home Lizars. They were to have seven children: Jane Home (1821 - 1894), later Maxwell; Catherine Dorcas Maule (1825 - 1888), later Strickland; Margaret Helen Hassells (1827 - 1898), later Landale; Alexander (1829 - 1893); Helen (1832 - 1902), later Ratcliff; William (1834 - 1869), and Charles John (1838 - 1917). Immediately after his marriage Jardine went to Paris with letters of introduction from Patrick Neill to A. Royer in the Jardin du Roi. He attended classes in anatomy and natural history, and was elected a member of the Wernerian Society in his absence.

In April 1821 William returned to succeed his father as seventh baronet. He continued his interest in natural history throughout his life, building up an extensive library and museum at Jardine Hall, which at one time included over 6,000 species of birds, and which was visited by many of the naturalists of the day. He was also a keen and energetic sportsman.

In 1825 Jardine and Prideaux John Selby toured Holland. After the publication of Selby's "Illustrations of British Ornithology" (1821 - 1834), Jardine, Selby and W.H. Lizars each took a third risk in publishing "Illustrations of Ornithology" (1826 - 1835). Jardine and Selby were responsible for most of the illustrations, but a few were contributed by J.J. Audubon, who visited Edinburgh in 1826 and gave drawing lessons to the other two. They were assisted in this publication by J.E. Bicheno, J.G. Children, R. Jameson, N.A. Vigors and the artist Patrick Syme, who supervised the colouring of the plates. All

of these individuals are represented in the Jardine correspondence.

In 1826 Jardine was elected Vice-President of the Wernerian Society and in 1827 an honorary member of the Scottish Academy. In 1829 he published a new edition of Gilbert White's "Natural History of Selborne", subsequently to be re-issued many times. In 1832 found Jardine writing the biography for an edition of Wilson's "American Ornithology".

Between 1832 and 1835, Jardine Hall was let, and the family lived at "the Holmes" near Dryburgh on the Tweed. It was at this time that Jardine joined the Berwickshire Naturalists' Club, of which he became President in 1836.

In December 1832 Lizars and Jardine conceived the idea of the immensely successful "Naturalist's Library". This was a popular and inexpensive, forty volume, illustrated series which made natural history accessible to the general public. The first volume sold over 7,000 copies (see W.H. Lizars, 21 January 1834). The first two volumes were printed by Ballantyne, but after 1834 printing was taken over by Neill and Co. Contributors with whom Jardine corresponded include: John Stevenson Bushman (ichthyology), James Duncan (entomology), Robert Hamilton (amphibious carnivores), Robert H. Schomburgk, the explorer (ichthyology of Guiana), Charles Hamilton Smith (dogs and horses), William Swainson (ornithology of W. Africa), George R. Waterhouse (marsupials) and the illustrator Edward Lear. Jardine himself wrote fourteen volumes.

There is considerable correspondence in the collection from W.H. Lizars in Edinburgh to Jardine at Jardine Hall, Lockerbie, about the progress of the "Naturalist's Library". Lizars was constantly urging Sir William to produce manuscripts, correct proofs and plates, and giving him information on the state of publication and finances. Lizars also sent Jardine books, and news of Edinburgh, other naturalists, family, friends and mutual acquaintances. The National Library of Scotland holds two scrapbooks of proof of plates and original drawings for the "Naturalist's Library".

In 1834 Jardine made a tour of Sutherlandshire, the natural history of which was largely unknown at the time. He was

THE extravagant price of Standard Works upon all departments of Natural Science, and the great difficulty of obtaining access to valuable foreign publications, have been a serious hindrance and discouragement to the studies of the Naturalist. There are also many sources of information upon his favourite subjects, which, not being altogether open, are apt to be overlooked by the student. Not a few eminent Naturalists have, in addition to their separate Works, given to the world numerous excellent papers and treatises in various periodicals and transactions of societies:—not a few have mixed up, with the voluminous details of their Travels and Voyages, scientific facts and disquisitions of much importance, but not available unless by the purchase of expensive works; and, in addition to this, the labours of the older British Naturalists, still deservedly celebrated and universally quoted in our rudimentary books, are for the most part rarely to be met with, and are usually comprised in unwieldy folios.

It is with the view of obviating these difficulties, and of enabling all classes to procure information regarding the *Great Works of Creation*, at a moderate price, and in a convenient shape, that the Proprietors of the NATURALIST'S LIBRARY have embarked in the undertaking. It will be their especial aim to make the history of the objects described, not only interesting and intelligible to the general reader, but of practical utility to the student and scientific Naturalist.

In the prosecution of their plan, they propose to illustrate the leading Zoological groups of the various branches, particularly such as are remarkable for their usefulness to man, or curious from the singularity of their structure or external beauty; and in order that purchasers may be enabled to avail themselves of the information conveyed regarding those classes of Animals, to which their tastes and pursuits may peculiarly lead, each department of the Work will be distinct by itself, and will appear in consecutive volumes, accompanied with appropriate tables, indexes, and illustrations.

Arrangements have been made by which the use of all the standard British and Foreign Publications, necessary to the execution of their design, is effectually secured. The illustrations proposed to be given, will be so numerous, that it will be impossible always to procure them from the specimens themselves, and the greatest care, therefore, will be used in selecting, from the most approved sources, the Plates which can be most confidently relied on for accuracy, both of delineation and colouring.

accompanied by his brother John, P.J. Selby, James Wilson and R.K. Greville. In 1835 John Gould, the ornithologist, artist and explorer, first visited Jardine.

Together with Selby and George Johnston (the first President of the Berwickshire Naturalists' Club), Jardine began publication of the "Magazine of Zoology and Botany" in 1836. There is considerable correspondence with Johnston, and some with Lizars, about the journal, which proved to be a financial failure. In 1838 it was amalgamated with Dr. William J. Hooker's "Companion to the Botanical Magazine", and brought out as the "Annals of Natural History", conducted by Jardine, Selby, Johnston, J.H.

The first Volume of the *Naturalist's Library*, printed at the Ballantyne Press, will be Published early in 1833. The size which has been chosen as most suitable for the Work, is Foolscap 8vo, similar to that of the last edition of the *Waverley Novels*. The price of each Volume will not exceed Six Shillings, elegant extra-boarded, and containing, besides the descriptive letterpress, from thirty to forty plates, engraved and coloured in the best manner.

While the Proprietors are unwilling to pledge themselves that the Volumes shall follow each other at regular stated intervals, they will take care to secure the convenience of the Trade, by issuing them at the same time with the Magazines and other Periodicals. Due intimation will also be given to the Public, by liberal Advertisements, of each as it appears.

Balfour, Hooker and Richard Taylor. In 1840 the "Annals" were united with Loudon and Charlesworth's "Magazine of Natural History" to become the "Annals and Magazine of Natural History". After 1858, Jardine was no longer involved as an editor. Many of Jardine's correspondents were fellow editors, or contributors to these journals.

In 1838 Jardine wrote his "British Salmonidae", which was an expensive volume and not a financial success.

Between 1839 and 1845, Jardine was involved in the Annandale Committee to urge the Beattock route for the

Caledonian railway line from Carlisle to Edinburgh and Glasgow. The line eventually ran through some Jardine property and there is reference to "the railway business" in the family correspondence.

Sir William usually attended the British Association meetings, frequently presiding over the zoological section. At the 1840 meeting in Glasgow he met H.E. Strickland (1811 - 1853), the zoologist and an originator of the Ray Society, who was later to marry Jardine's talented daughter Catherine. In the same year William Yarrell, the zoologist and artist, stayed at Jardine Hall.

William Jardine took an active part in local affairs, acting as a Justice of the Peace, Commissioner of Supply, and in 1841 as Deputy Lieutenant for Dumfriesshire.

Jardine visited Ireland in 1845. The journal of this visit, in the form of letters home to his wife, is in Edinburgh University Library.

1848 saw the publication of "The Dodo and its Kindred" by Strickland and A.G. Melville. There are a number of letters in the collection from Catherine to her father about the book and the new "anastatic" method of producing prints from drawings made with lithographic chalk. Catherine contributed a number of plates to the book, using this method. Jardine and Strickland subsequently began publication of "Contributions to Ornithology", a periodical intended for private circulation, using this new and cheaper process of reproduction. Catherine again contributed a large number of the illustrations.

In 1853 Strickland was tragically killed by a train while examining the geological strata in a railway cutting. Jardine and Catherine later edited his "Ornithological Synonyms" (1855) and Jardine wrote "Memoirs of H.E. Strickland" (1858).

In 1855 William Jardine became a co-editor of the "Edinburgh New Philosophical Journal" with Hutton Balfour and Dr. Thomas Anderson. In 1860 he was appointed Royal Commissioner to the Salmon Fisheries Survey of England and Wales, together with William Ffennell and George K. Rickards. In 1862 he was invited to be President of the newly formed Dumfriesshire and Galloway Natural History and Antiquarian Society.

After his wife Jane died in 1871, Sir William married Hyacinthe, daughter of W.S. Symonds. In 1873 he apparently considered selling his collections, realising that his eldest son, Alexander, a civil engineer, was not interested in natural history. He therefore began preparing a catalogue of the bird skins, which was completed after his death by Edith Kent, a cousin of Jardine's second wife. Unfortunately in 1886 Alexander allowed the collections to be auctioned without this catalogue, by Messrs. Puttick and Simpson, who were inexperienced in natural history collections. Copies of the original catalogue and the sale catalogue are in the R.S.M. Library.

Sir William died at the Isle of Wight on 26 November 1874, and was buried in Applegirth Kirkyard.

Jardine corresponded with fellow naturalists and other travellers all over the world, discussing natural history,

exchanging and obtaining specimens for his collections. Correspondents of note not already mentioned include: Edward Blythe, the zoologist from Calcutta; Charles Lucien Bonaparte, Prince of Musignano (Bonaparte's nephew), the zoologist; Henry Denny, the expert on bird parasites and curator of the Leeds Museum; the brothers Edward and Henry Doubleday, entomologists; T.C. Eyton, naturalist; Edmond Fairemaire, the zoologist from Paris; Edward Forbes, the marine biologist and geologist; Louis Fraser, naturalist to the Niger expedition; John S. Henslow, the botanist and teacher of Darwin, to whom he refers briefly (9 January 1837); Jan van der Hoefer, the comparative anatomist from Leiden; William Jameson the botanist from Guayaquil, Peru; Leonard Jenyns (later Blomefield) who described the fish specimens from the Beagle; Thomas C. Jerdon, the zoologist from Nellore, India; William Bell Macdonald, the linguist, who translated foreign papers for Jardine; J.T. MacKay the botanist from Dublin; Sir William Rae, the naval surgeon from Tasmania; Peter Rylands, the politician, also interested in natural history; W. Thompson, the naturalist from Belfast, and Hewett Cottrell Watson, the botanist.

There is an interesting letter from Robert Ball, the naturalist, about the construction of an artificial dripping cave; and one from James Braid, the hypnotist. Allan Cunningham, the botanist, writes about the murder of his brother, Richard, also a botanist, while on an expedition in New South Wales. There are a number of letters from Susan C. Murray, sister to Jardine's neighbour at Murraythwaite, about their travels on the continent. Sir John Sinclair, M.P., writes briefly about the discovery of anthracite. The correspondence with John Washington, hydrographer and Secretary to the Royal Geographical Society, includes a draft of Jardine's instructions to Louis Fraser as naturalist to the Niger expedition.

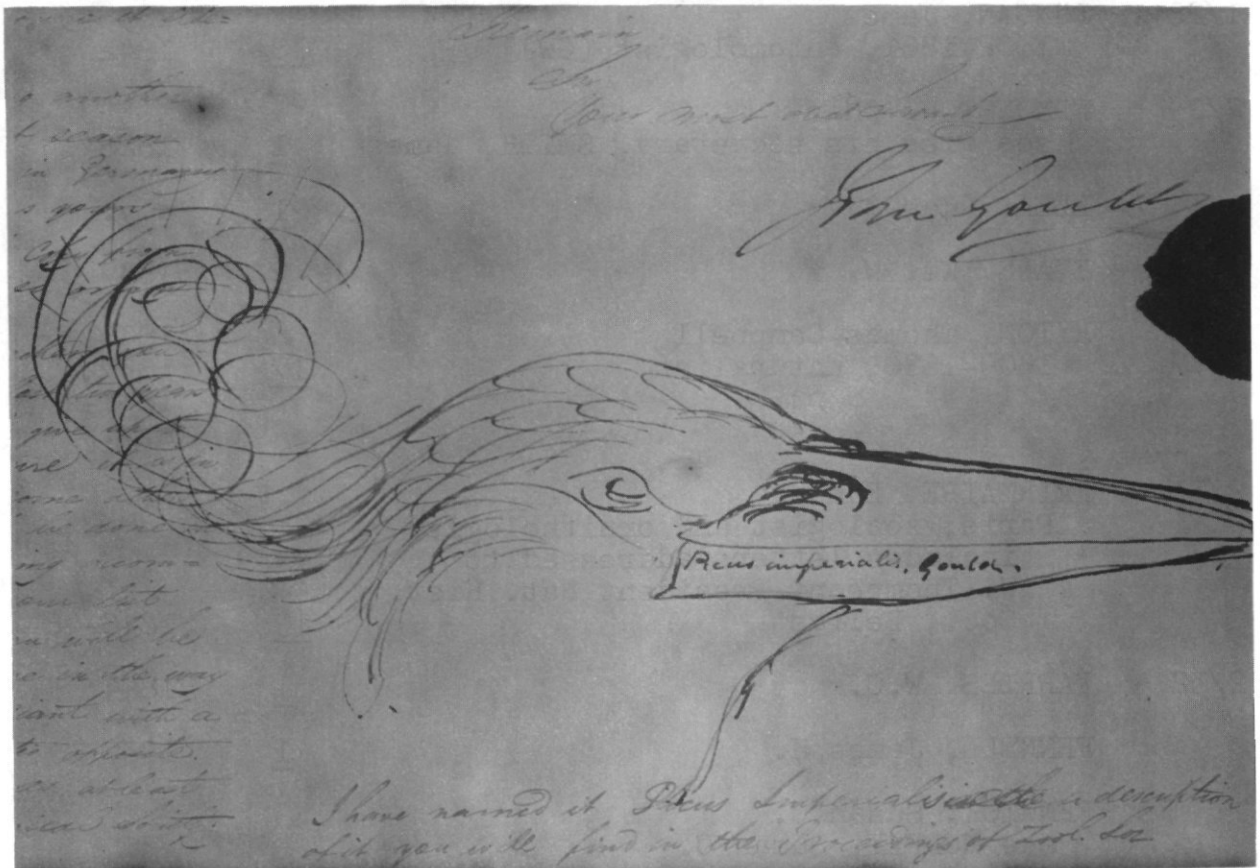

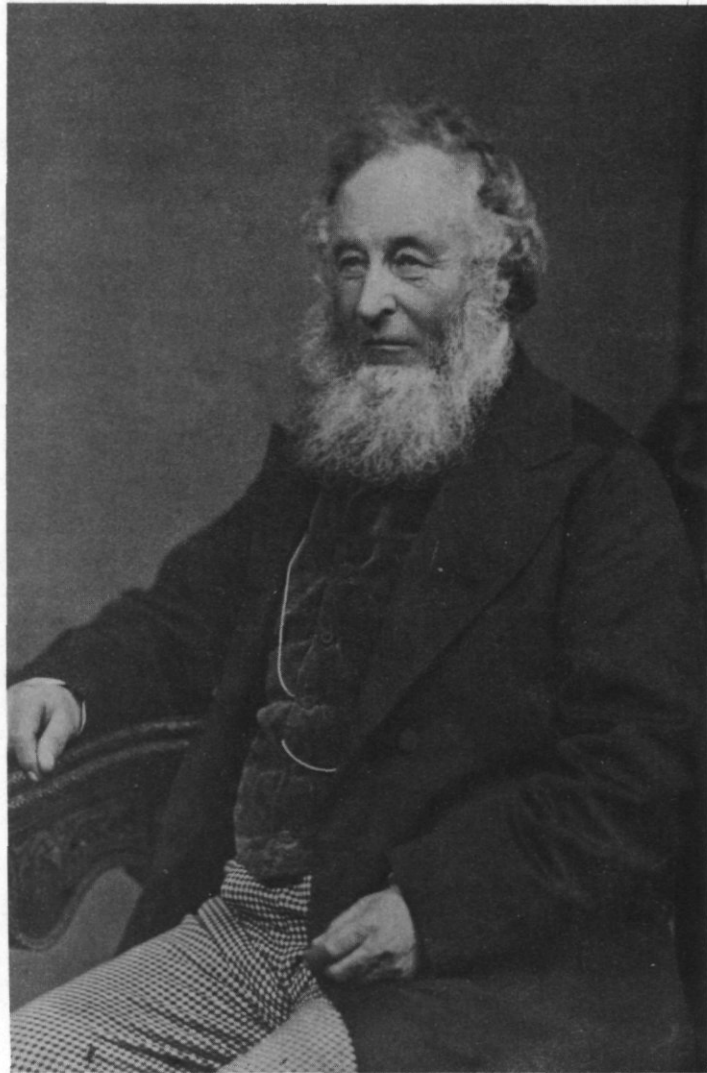

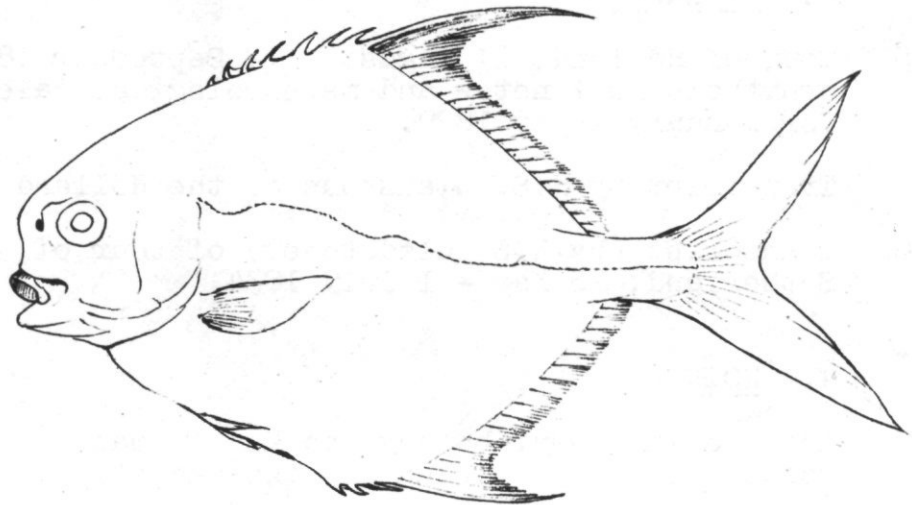

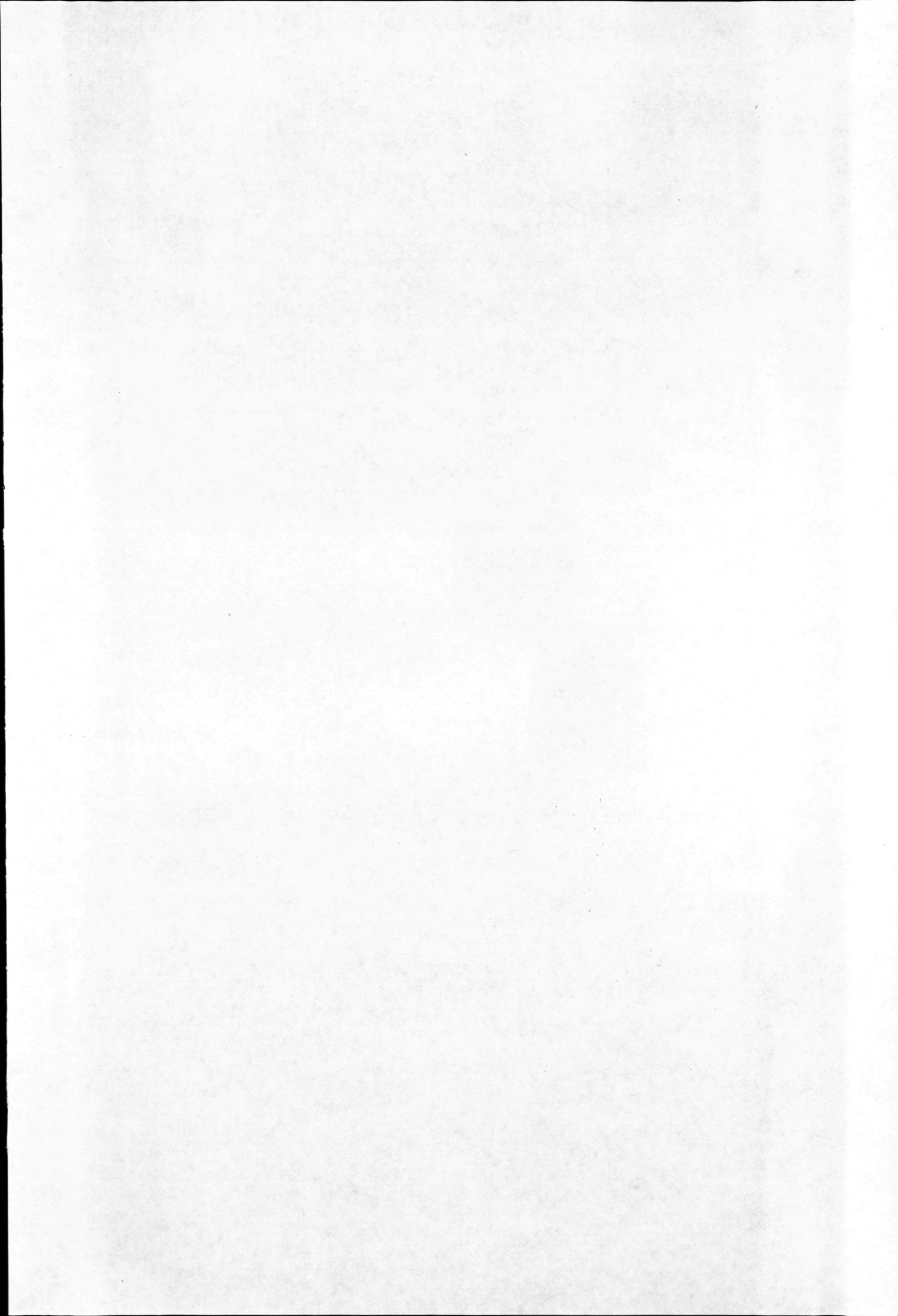

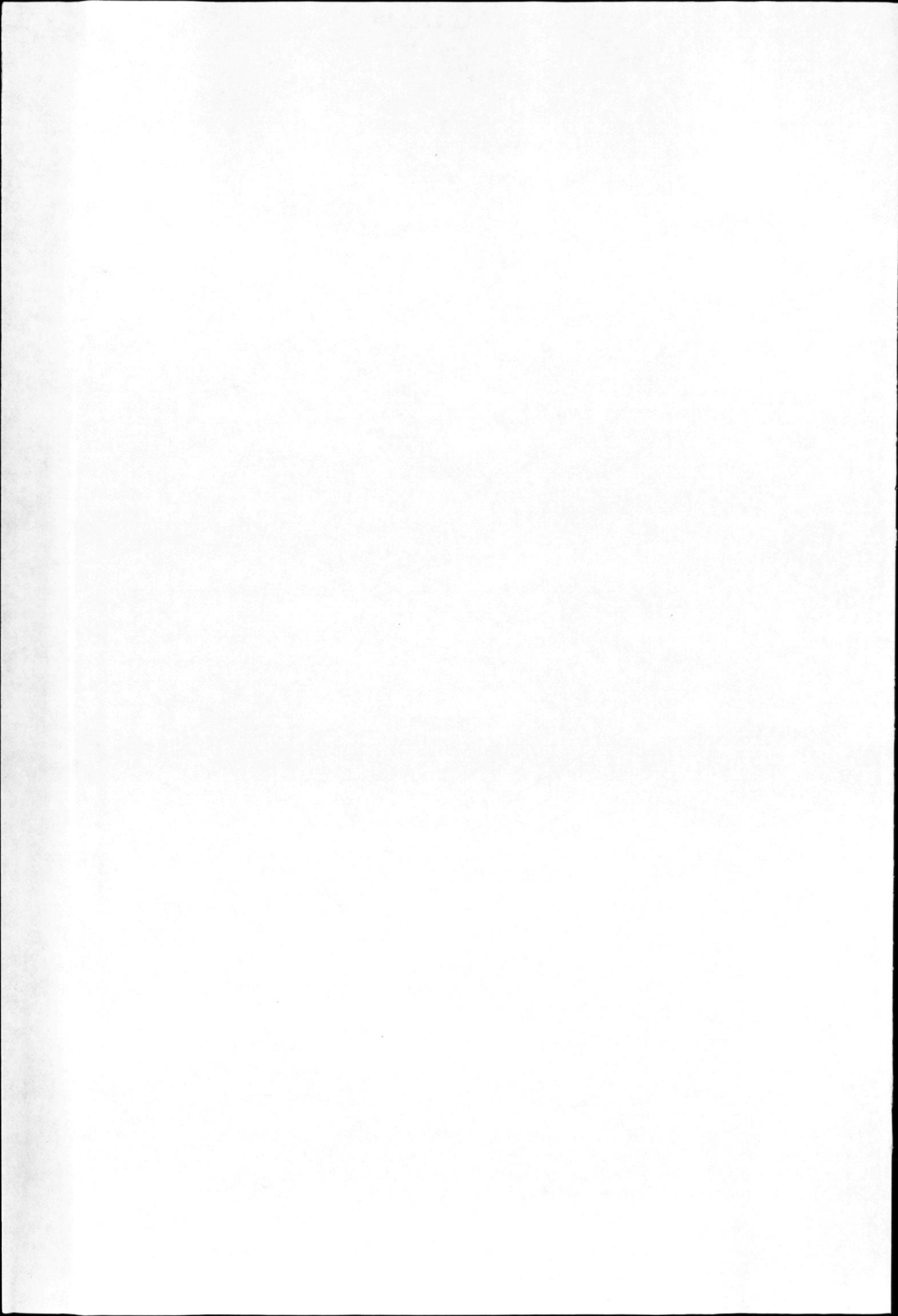
